# Anticipating the Needs of Global Society

Centered on courses in comparative culture, international business and economics, and social studies, the broad interdisciplinary curriculum of the Faculty of Liberal Arts aims to extend students' general knowledge while developing their critical thinking. A wide range of courses on Japan enables students to understand both present-day Japan and its traditions in a global context.

### Curriculum

The curriculum of the Faculty of Liberal Arts enables students to acquire a strong academic foundation and intellectual orientation before selecting a disciplinary major. During the first year, students develop their writing and analytic skills, and take introductory courses in a range of academic disciplines. In their sophomore year, students select one of three majors (Comparative Culture, International Business and Economics, or Social Studies) in which to concentrate. In their junior and senior years, students take advanced courses in their selected major as well as continuing to study in courses outside their major. Many students also take advantage of the numerous short-term and long-term study abroad programs to enrich their educational experience.

### SPECIALIZED EDUCATION

#### ■ FLA CORE PROGRAM

The Core Program, compulsory for all FLA degree students during the first and second years of study, enhances students' writing, public speaking, and critical thinking skills, and prepares students for specialized study. Students are assigned to the appropriate level in the Core Program based on an English placement test that all students take upon entering the Faculty.

#### **MAJOR COURSES:**

Students choose a major at the end of the first term of their second year and take courses according to the requirements of their major.

#### **■** COMPARATIVE CULTURE

The Comparative Culture major follows an interdisciplinary approach to knowledge in the three fields of Art History, Literature, and Religion -Philosophy. By studying these fields students learn methods for understanding the cultural expression of the human spirit, emotions, thought, and aspirations as well as the societies and institutions from which they arose.

#### ■ INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS AND ECONOMICS

Courses offered in the International Business and Economics major focus on developing skills in theoretical and empirical analysis and learning to apply these skills to real-world economic phenomena and managerial problems. The focus is on the international dimensions of business and economics. Within this global context, special attention is given to Japanese business and economic studies.

#### ■ SOCIAL STUDIES

The Social Studies major, consisting of Anthropology -Sociology, History, and Political Science, provides students with historical, comparative, and theoretical insights into the processes that constitute civilizations and society. Courses consider how particular societies and cultures have changed over time, patterns of similarity and difference, and how these processes have been depicted in popular and scholarly imagination. Advanced courses encourage first-hand study of social phenomena through collection and analysis of original data.

### **GENERAL STUDIES**

The General Studies (GS) requirements allow students to study beyond a specialized area, facilitating interdisciplinary understanding of academic fields and reflection upon fundamental human and social issues. In addition to Studies in Christian Humanism, Liberal Arts of the Body, and Overview of Data Science, the Faculty offers GS distribution courses in three categories: Society and Culture, Cultural Traditions, and Politics and Economy.

Professor of Political Science

If you are interested in why human beings behave the way they do individually, collectively and across different cultures, then social studies is the major for you. In my political science classes students leam about power, conflict and the ideas underpinning public affairs, such as justice, democracy and rights. Through lively class debates, students develop an understanding of unfolding global political events, discovering more about their own beliefs and how to express them with nuance in the process. Research essays, presentations and

class discussions train students to build their own arguments and to critically assess the arguments of others, skills that are valuable in a wide variety of professions.

Studying politics enables students to understand the origins and functions of institutions, systems and structures that affect people's lives every day. Knowing how political institutions work and their pressure points, allows individuals to influence these systems for their own and society's benefit. Studying political science can be the first step to changing the world.

# Admissions

### For First-Year Students

### 1. Regular Admissions (Document screening)

Acceptance decisions are made on the basis of SAT/ACT/IB Diploma/GCE A levels scores (grades), TOEFL/IELTS scores, official high school transcripts, an essay, and two recommendation letters.



### 2. Admissions by Recommendation (Only for Japanese high school students)

Those who are enrolled in Japanese high schools and whose first choice is Sophia University can apply for Admissions by Recommendation. Students must meet a language and a high school GPA requirement to apply. Applicants must take an on-campus test and interview on Yotsuya Campus.



### For Transfer Students (Juniors)

Those who are expected to have completed two full academic years or more of university/college\* education as full-time students can apply as transfer students. They must complete at least two years of study in residence in order to receive a Sophia University degree.

### For Students Interested in Short-term Study

### 1. Non-Degree Program

Non-degree students are those who enroll in the Faculty of Liberal Arts for one or two semesters to take undergraduate courses and obtain credits but do not intend to receive an academic degree. This status is applicable only to international students who will enroll as full-time students. Most of the undergraduate courses, as well as Japanese language courses, are available to non-degree students. Applications are accepted directly from applicants or through CIEE (The U.S. based Council on International Educational Exchange).



### 2. Exchange Program

Students from one of Sophia's exchange partner institutions may apply as exchange students for one or two semesters of study abroad. (See page 9.)

### 3. Short-term Programs

The following short-term programs are available for international students.\*

- -Summer Session in East Asian Studies and Japanese Language (3-6 weeks in June to July)
- -January Session in Japanese Studies (3 weeks in January)

# Financial Assistance

### 1. Sophia University Scholarship Programs

### New Student Scholarship

This scholarship is offered to prospective degree students (whose first choice is Sophia) who show excellent academic potential and are facing financial hardship. The grant varies from one-third to the full amount of tuition. The application should be submitted at the time of application for admission, and grantees will be notified upon acceptance to the university.

### Sophia University Tuition Support Scholarship

This scholarship is offered to degree students who are in good standing and experiencing financial problems that make it difficult for them to continue

their studies. The grant varies from one-third to the full amount of tuition. Applicants are accepted after the entrance to the university.

### Sophia University Benefactors' Scholarships

These scholarships are provided by benefactors in and outside Japan. Some of the scholarships are application-based, while others are recommendation-based

where the Dean of the faculty selects and recommends the recipients. Applications for these scholarships are accepted through the university after the entrance.

### 2. Scholarships Offered by Public or Private Institutions

More than 100 kinds of scholarship programs are available. About 60 of them are for international students with student visa status (each scholarship has its own requirements and criteria, and most of them require Japanese proficiency). Applications for these scholarships are accepted through the university after the entrance.


